What is Open Source software?

Open Source software is available free to anyone around the world. It is software developed by a wide variety of people for an even wider variety of uses.

Unlike "shareware" and "free-ware", Open Source software is more than just free of charge. The "source code" – the human-readable recipe used to create the software – is available, as well.

In the scientific realm, today's discoveries are built on those of the past. Similarly, Open Source software naturally evolves and extends from earlier works.

Who Uses Open Source?

Movie makers such as Dream Works use it to create your favorite movies, like *Shrek*, *Star Wars*, *Lord of the Rings*.

Internet companies from your local dial-up Internet service provider (ISP) to Google and Yahoo! search engines.

Businesses you buy from, like Amazon.com and Ford Motor Company.

Government organizations such as NASA, the National Weather Service, the US Postal Service, and the Dept. of Defense.

Major computer companies like Apple, IBM, Oracle and Hewlett-Packard; and elementary schools to major universities. You're already benefiting from Open Source today, in ways you might not realize! Have you ever searched the web using Google, watched TV on a TiVo, or used an Apple iBook?

- *Google.com* uses a 'cluster' of over 1500 Linux-based computers to provide their search service.
- The TiVo digital TV recorder runs Linux!
- Apple's Mac OS X operating system and Safari web browser are based on Open Source software.

Open Source software is being used more and more to create the 3D graphics and special effects we see in movies and on TV.

- Over 2/3rd of websites on the Internet are powered by the Open Source *Apache* web server. (Many also use Open Source databases and programming languages like *MySQL, Perl* and *PHP*.)

How can I use Open Source?


While many people only associate "Open Source" with the Linux operating system, that's only the tip of the iceberg!

With **The Gimp**, photographers and artists can create stunning imagery.


